Sometimes these days it's hard for us to be optimistic and stay positive. It's true that this virus is serious and as we already know has likely changed how we live and work. It's easy to stay focused on the negative side however I have seen and believe in the hard work, creative energy, and community spirit that shines forth on a regular basis from our Pierce County 4-H family. To help keep that spirit alive and well here are some tips to focus on the positive so that you have the energy and resolve needed to weather the storm:

Limit your intake - You could watch 24-hour news channels, listen to dire warnings on the radio, or visit countless websites and be bombarded with the angst of the moment. Instead, choose a single news source and decide how much limited time you'll spend with it each day. And stick to your plan.

Look to the past - Get hope from your past resilience. You have likely endured other unforeseen major life disruptors like 9/11, major winter weather, or the financial meltdown of 2008. You made it through! And you are stronger because of it. Know that you will get through this. Remind yourself of your resilience on a regular basis.

Watch a funny video - Thanks to the huge popularity of YouTube, there are thousands of videos that can help you take your mind off current events, if only for three minutes at a time. Start to bookmark the funniest among them so you can return for a repeat viewing whenever things feel gloomy.

Look after your neighbors - You may be at low risk of severe consequences from the virus, but it may not be the same for your neighbors whose immune systems are compromised. The act of checking in on them (keeping 6 feet apart, of course) will not only make them feel good, it will make you feel good and remind you that there are others for whom this predicament is even more stressful.

Support your favorite local business - Maybe you're heeding the social distancing advice and aren't eager to sit in a crowded restaurant right now. And others feel the same way. Those empty seats aren't helping that restaurant owner to pay her staff or keep the restaurant in business. Buy a gift card to help the business owner now, and prepay for a wonderful meal you can have to celebrate when this pandemic is behind us.

Send gifts in the mail - it may not be wise to drop in on your loved ones with some fresh baked goodies, so send them a card or gift in the mail. Unexpected treats can be a huge pick me up in times of stress. This is especially valuable to the elderly who are living in nursing homes. Many facilities have closed their doors to all visitors, making residents feel even more isolated and vulnerable.

Take advantage of found time - I'm an educator and my in-person teaching and training gigs are canceling left and right. It's stressful. I could wallow in that for days. But that wouldn't be productive. These cancellations give me an opportunity to focus on some things I've had no time for and to accelerate my progress on other ways to do trainings. It's liberating, and that's what I've decided to focus on. If your company or school has implemented a work from home policy, how will you use the time you previously spent on commuting or riding the bus?

Practice random acts of kindness - Leave an envelope with a little gift for the Amazon delivery person who drops off your supplies outside your door. Or have a coffee delivered to your chiropractor. Your kindness doesn't require a monetary outlay. Write an unsolicited review for a friend of yours who is authoring some type of written material. Comment on a colleagues LinkedIn post. Send a snail mail note of appreciation to a friend or family member. Many in the entire country of Italy broke out in song and applause to honor their healthcare workers. Thank the custodians or school cooks in your building or workplace for their efforts to keep things safe. Think of those who could benefit from your thoughtfulness and generosity. Then act.

Take a daily inventory - Close your day, every day, with a positive acknowledgment of something you accomplished, learned or are grateful for. It will help dilute some of the negativity you absorbed and remind you that not everything that's happening right now is bad or depressing.

In times of constant negative messaging, you need an antidote so that you can keep your positive attitude and march forward with determination and hope. Be deliberate in activities that are positive, heartwarming, stress reducing, and laughter inducing! Together, we will get through this.

Delivering 4-H Through Technology

Engaging 4-H Youth through Virtual Meetings and Learning Opportunities

Technology offers a venue for youth voice and discussion. Below you will find information on how to host and conduct 4-H meetings in a safe and educational way. Take a few minutes to review each link. These will provide best practices for you as a volunteer when meeting with youth.

Tips for Engaging 4-H Youth in Online Learning*

Wisconsin 4-H uses Zoom for meetings and educational learning opportunities. *Remember* when participating in a 4-H meeting, whether in person or virtually, the 4-H volunteer expectations and 4-H youth member code of conduct apply.

Extension, Wisconsin 4-H, and Fair FAQ

The University of Wisconsin - Madison Division of Extension has long been a partner with the county fair. County fairs have consistently been a venue for educators to deliver programming related to youth development, community development, agriculture, and family development. Extension and the Wisconsin Association of Fairs (WAF) have been working closely over the past year and a half to accentuate the educational opportunities at county fairs.

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, UW-Madison and Extension have made some decisions regarding in-person programming. All Extension in-person events planned for May are cancelled or postponed. Large events (>50 people) planned for June are cancelled or postponed. We are following state guidelines as they are announced and our programming guidance will be updated accordingly.

With these recent announcements, we have been asked questions about what this means for 4-H member participation and Extension staff involvement at county fairs. <u>May is Asian/Pacific American Heritage Month</u> - a celebration of Asians and Pacific Islanders in the United States. A rather broad term, Asian/Pacific encompasses all of the Asian continent and the Pacific islands of Melanesia (New Guinea, New Caledonia, Vanuatu, Fiji and the Solomon Islands), Micronesia (Marianas, Guam, Wake Island, Palau, Marshall Islands, Kiribati, Nauru and the Federated States of Micronesia) and Polynesia (New Zealand, Hawaiian Islands, Rotuma, Midway Islands, Samoa, American Samoa, Tonga, Tuvalu, Cook Islands, French Polynesia and Easter Island).

Like most commemorative months, Asian/Pacific American Heritage Month originated with Congress. In 1977 Reps. Frank Horton of New York introduced <u>House Joint Resolution 540</u> to proclaim the first ten days in May as Pacific/Asian American Heritage Week. In the same year, Senator Daniel Inouye introduced a similar resolution, <u>Senate Joint Resolution 72</u>. Neither of these resolutions passed, so in June 1978, Rep. Horton introduced <u>House Joint Resolution 1007</u>. This resolution proposed that the President should "proclaim a week, which is to include the seventh and tenth of the month, during the first ten days in May of 1979 as 'Asian/Pacific American Heritage Week.'" This joint resolution was passed by the House and then the Senate and was signed by President Jimmy Carter on October 5, 1978 to become <u>Public Law 95-419</u> (PDF, 158kb). This law amended the original language of the bill and directed the President to issue a proclamation for the "7 day period beginning on May 4, 1979 as 'Asian/Pacific American Heritage Week.'" During the next decade, presidents passed annual proclamations for Asian/Pacific American Heritage Week until 1990 when Congress passed <u>Public Law 101-283</u> (PDF, 166kb) which expanded the observance to a month for 1990. Then in 1992, Congress passed <u>Public Law 102-450</u> (PDF, 285kb) which annually designated May as Asian/Pacific American Heritage Month.

The month of May was chosen to commemorate the immigration of the first Japanese to the United States on May 7, 1843, and to mark the anniversary of the completion of the transcontinental railroad on May 10, 1869. Fall Forum is a statewide learning opportunity for Youth 7th grade - 13th grade, adult volunteers & staff. Staff and teams are encouraged to submit proposals for this year's **Fall Forum**, **November 6**-**8**. Proposals are due no later than **May 15** - earlier is better. This is a great opportunity for a team of county/state staff, volunteers and youth to work together and present an interactive workshop for youth and adults as well as staff from throughout Wisconsin. Last year; over 400 youth and adult leaders plus staff attended. The committee's goal is to increase this to 500 participants (youth, adults and staff).

There are two options for you to get involved in teaching: There will be 15 - 25 learning stations on Friday evening and over 25 different workshops offered on Saturday.

Interactive Learning Stations - Friday evening November 6:

Time: $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours - Friday evening from 7:00 - 9:00 p.m.

Format: This is an open room concept where participants move from station to station. They may spend 5-10 minutes to 20 minutes depending how you want the learner to engage. Consider hands-on experiences that helps the learner connect with the content.

Extend the Learning: We are asking this year for each station to have a handout with information about the activity or learning experience so they can use this information once they return to their county. The hope is to also have a place to upload these documents so they can also be accessed electronically.

Workshops - Saturday, November 7:

Time: Sessions are $1\frac{1}{2}$ - 2 hours in length

Format: Hands-on experiences that help youth and adult volunteers and staff see how this could be replicated when they return to their club and county.

Extend the Learning: We are asking this year for each workshop to have a handout with the lessons that are taught so participants can use this information once they return to their county. The hope is to also have a place to upload these documents so they can also be accessed electronically.

2020 STEM for All Video Showcase
