
TIME CAPSULE TIME!

New Market Beef Weigh-in Date: Sunday, March 6, 2022 from NOON-3pm

The weigh in will be held in the scale house at the Pierce County Fairgrounds. We will use the same process that was emailed out for the original weigh in date. We will also email a reminder out closer to the date with complete weigh-in information. Please email the livestock committee if you have questions.

- All market steers & heifers <u>MUST</u> be weighed at this weigh in to be shown at the fair! This is a requirement per the fairbook.
- Market feeders & breeding stock animals do not need to be weighed in.
- Please remember that animals should halter broke.
- Please have a halter on your animals when you bring them to the weigh in.



Choosing the Right Activity

April 2020

When choosing an activity for an individual or a group of youth, volunteers are encouraged to consider the following:



FIT—Think about the group you're planning for.

- What are they interested in?—Connect to what sparks youths' interest. If you have a
 large group with wide interests, make sure you offer a variety of activities from one
 event to the next.
- What are their grade levels? Experience levels with the topic? Ability levels?—
 Asking these questions helps us meet the youth where they are. It helps to understand
 the characteristics of different ages of young people. However, we may need to ask
 youth to find out how much experience or skill they have with a topic.

FUN(+)—4-H activities should be fun. Always. In positive youth development, most activities also follow the Experiential Learning Model. This means the youth get to DO something in a hands-on way. Then, the volunteer supports learning by providing time to REFLECT about the activity and the chance to think about how the life skills learned may APPLY to other settings. This allows youth to build on what they learned creating a FUN+ situation, every time.

SAFE—Is the activity safe? What would be needed to make it safe for your group?

- Physical safety means different things at different ages. For youth in grades K-2,
 physical safety means the activity should be so safe that even if they don't follow the
 directions, they still won't be hurt. For older teens who need to be able to take bigger
 risks, physical safety means preparing them and minimizing the risks we know about.
- Psychological safety means that young people feel mentally and emotionally safe. In a positive youth development setting, this means feeling a sense of belonging and having positive interactions with others. All youth need to feel included in a meaningful way, regardless of their gender, ethnicity, sexual orientations, or ability.

FOR ALL—Is the activity equitable and inclusive for all? How can older youth be involved in helping to keep younger youth engaged? What activity choices or adaptations might help you make sure all youth are included?

These questions provide an opportunity to dig deeper into the FIT discussed above. FIT was for the group; FOR ALL is for individuals who may feel left out for one reason or another. Consider what may make an individual youth feel excluded—such as language, culture, ability, background or other factors—from the activity and think about what adaptations might be needed to make sure everyone can participate equitably.

TRUST—Fun, engaging activities are not hard to find on the Internet. A simple Google or Pinterest search turns up an overwhelming number of possibilities. However, most of these activities will not include the (+) discussed in FUN(+). Using Extension or University resources increases the likelihood of finding activities that have both the FUN and the (+).

(TIME)—Unfortunately, many activities exist that are old or out-of-date. When choosing an activity, take a moment to consider how the world has changed since the resource was created. Consider things like how technology or communication has changed, the words we use to talk to or about people, and other changes over the last few decades. What updates might need to make the resource current and timely?

Wildlife WHEP & Forestry 4-H Friends,

Astronomy is one of the oldest natural sciences. Humans have been using the stars and planets to navigate, establish calendars and understand natural phenomenon. One of the oldest and most recognizable constellations is the Big Dipper. The Big Dipper is a clipped version of the constellation Ursa Major the Greater Bear, with the Big Dipper stars outlining the Bear's tail and hindquarters. In the lore of the Mi'kmaq nation in northern Canada, the Big Dipper is a Celestial Bear, and the three stars of the handle are hunters chasing the Bear. In autumn, the hunters finally catch up with the Bear and it's said that the blood from the Bear colors the landscape. When the Celestial Bear is seen on the northern horizon in late fall and early winter evenings, it's a sign that the hibernation season is upon us. The Big Dipper moves about 4 minutes per day - arriving in its same spot one year later. How can you tell stars from planets and satellites? The planets follow about the same path as the sun. During the day, pay attention to where the sun travels across the sky. After dark, look along the same path for the planets. Planets reflect a steady light. With binoculars, a star is a point of light while a planet looks round. The best time to spot a satellite is about one hour after sunset. Since satellites don't have flashing lights like airplanes you will only see them when they are in sunlight. After sunset, it is dark on earth, but satellites are so high that the sun is still shining on them. Most satellites move from west to east.

2022 Wildlife & Woods Virtual Classes – Coming Soon! More Wildlife and Woods Virtual Sessions. Wildlife and Woods is Wisconsin 4-H's statewide natural sciences, wildlife, and forestry virtual event.

Outdoor enthusiasts get to connect with other 4-H youth grades 3-13 from around the state. Together, we explore the natural world with a special focus on wildlife, wildlife habitats, and forests. Participants learn about wild places across the United States following the 4-H Wildlife Habitat Education Program (WHEP) and the 4-H Forestry Program. Each month focuses on a different habitat, some of its plants and critters. Materials are designed for all ages and knowledge levels, so everyone can benefit. Since the sessions are co-led by youth and adult leaders, the youth leadership opportunities are plentiful.

Youth leaders can research about wildlife, trees, management concepts and management practices; prepare slides; lead activities; present topics from slides; record videos; or read announcements. Youth leaders also meet virtually the week before for prep and practice. Being a part of this team is great preparation for WHEP and Forestry competitions. After a 4-H record book is completed and the 4-H Cover

Letter is accepted in to the Extension Office, continuing nominees will be invited to Interviews for the trip and award recommendation process. Bring your Record Book to the Interview if chosen. Interviews will be held on

Trip interviews will be conducted in the months of late February and/or early March.

Bring your completed 4-H Record Book along to the interview.

Candidates will be notified by April 16th of Award Trip selections.

Award Trip candidates who cannot attend Trip Interviews must notify the 4-H Program Educator by February 26th and receive an approved excuse. With an approved excuse, the member is responsible for arranging for the interview to be conducted with the 4-H Youth Development Agent prior to the scheduled interview date.

Not necessarily all members who apply for a trip with a Cover Letter will be awarded an interview or a 4-H Award Trip. Cover Letters and Record Books are subject to standards of completion. The Cover Letter and Record Book should represent a 4-H member's best work.

Award Trip Payment:

The Pierce County 4-H Leaders' Council will pay a portion of a 4-H member's fee and/or expenses for one award trip per year, for each trip during their 4-H career. (Must meet requirements specific to each trip in addition to those county requirements listed above). A refundable \$50 application fee is required made out to: "PIERCE COUNTY 4-H", with your award trip cover letter and recommendation.

The Extension Office will send a commitment form to selected participants following final interview selections. The commitment form with the member's signature and his/her parent's signature along with the specified deposit must be turned in by the posted date. The remaining balance must be paid by the dates set by the Extension Office. The payments could be several small increments or one large sum closer to the date of travel. In any case, the entire amount of the delegate's fees must be paid no later than two weeks prior to the trip.

If the member defaults on the trip, after turning in the commitment form, and chooses not to attend, the member is responsible for the entire cost of the trip. If the Leaders' Council has paid a scholarship portion of the trip and the member defaults on the trip, after turning in the commitment form, and chooses not to attend, the member is responsible to pay that portion back to the Leaders' Council.

If a member defaults on a trip due to an emergency, for example: death in family, critical illness, divorce, or any other reasonable cause, the Leaders Council has the right to allow default of the trip and require that no repayment be made.

If a member needs a disciplined plan in making payments, a payment plan may be set up with the 4-H Program Educator in conjunction with the 4-H Adult Advisors Council on an individual case-by-case basis. The payment plan can be kept private.

Adult Recommendation

- I provided the adult recommendation form and a pre-addressed envelope to an adult that is not my relative that can speak to my qualifications to receive a trip or award at least two weeks before the form is due
- I provided the adult with pertinent information about the 4-H Cover Letter and Record Book process.

Overall

- I have completed every component of the Cover Letter thoroughly.
- I was concise, but I also included specific details.
- Unless instructed otherwise, I wrote in paragraphs with complete sentences.
- I feel it is reflective and thoughtful.
- It is representative of my most significant 4-H experiences to date.
- I took time to complete my Cover Letter with care.
- It is an example of my best written communication skills.
- It includes evidence of accomplishments, leadership, improvement, reflection, and learning.
- I know my Cover Letter has few spelling or grammar errors because not only have I proofread it, but so has another trusted adult.

TIPS FOR CREATING YOUR COVER LETTER

<u>Use a computer</u>. You can save your work and make revisions as necessary. This is especially helpful for future use. The cover letter and envelope should not be handwritten.

<u>Plan ahead</u>. Go through each part of the cover letter before typing. Use your old record books to help you. Put your thoughts together. Translate your skills into action oriented, concise, descriptions. As much as possible, think of your 4-H experience as a job. What do you do? What skills have you developed as a result of participation in 4-H? How have you personally changed as a result of your 4-H experience?

<u>Layout, design, and formatting.</u> Your cover letter should be easy to read and understand. Choose an appropriate font and font size. Use the same 1-2 fonts throughout your document. As a general rule, a 1" margin is used at the top, bottom and on both sides of your page. Use action words and be short, concise and to the point. Logical arrangement is very important in a cover letter!

<u>Editing</u>. Your documents should be free of spelling and grammar errors. Use spelling and grammar check and follow that up by having at least two adults proofread your cover letter. Do not use contractions, abbreviations, or 4-H jargon.

<u>Individualize it.</u> This is YOUR cover letter; add your own personality to it. This provides you the opportunity to express emotion, which is evident in a good cover letter. In addition, this is a great way to tailor your cover letter for this particular application.

Put it ALL down. Don't be modest or shy about your accomplishments and experiences. A cover letter is your chance to highlight your unique skills and qualities. Assume your reader does not know you; provide as complete a description of accomplishments as possible. Remember, accomplishments are about what you have learned, how you have grown, what skills you have developed and what you have experienced, not about awards or ribbons. The accomplishments you discuss in your cover letter should refer to your 4-H Record Book, not repeat it. In addition, the cover letter should explain your accomplishments and experiences in a story-like format that works with the information provided in your 4-H Record Book. This allows you to go in-depth about important knowledge and skills and relate them to the expectations of the "employer" and provide a sample of your written communication skills.
